# THE CYCLE OF ABUSE



### Abuser vs. Survivor

Useful questions to ask to find out this sort of information include:	Are you afraid of what your partner will do to you or the children if you take certain decisions or do certain things?	Do you feel free to live your life in the way you choose?	Do you feel like you are frequently 'walking on eggshells'?
Do you change what you do because you are fearful of your partner's reactions to you?	Do you have equal access to finances?	Have you been injured? Can you tell me more about this?	Have you ever felt you had to use violence to defend yourself or your children? Can you tell me more about this?

# What does reporting DV/SA entail?

- Police Report
- Mandated Arrest (WA State Law)
- Investigation
- Forensic Exam aka Rape Kit
- Criminal/civil proceedings

# Safety Planning (How to and what is it?)

Location and Tracking services (devices utilized, phone location, car tracking)

To go bag

Important documents + Copies

Is abuser scared of Law Enforcement?

Will a piece of paper stop someone from harming (DVPO, NCO)?

What locations are frequented (grocery store, kids school, work, etc)?

Did you identify roadblocks in the plans? Worst case scenarios

We cannot guarantee safety for survivors, we can only help increase safety measures.



Tips for Advocacy and working with DV Survivors

- Domestic violence impacts all areas of life (housing, finances, employment, mental health, legal issues, children, etc.), so advocacy must be <u>flexible</u> to respond accordingly.
- Key components of advocacy:
  - Survivor centered and driven
  - Safety focused
  - Trauma-informed
  - Confidentiality

How can you support survivors?

- 1. Listen and believe survivors
- 2. Don't judge or blame them
- 3. Assure them that they deserve to feel safe and loved by their partner
- 4. ALWAYS keep the survivor centered in the conversation. If they do not want services, do not pressure them to get services. They know their lives best.
- 5. Provide information, resources, and tools, allowing them to make their own decisions whether you agree or not



# How can you support survivors?

6. Let the survivor know you're concerned about their safety and create space to help them plan for their safety

7. Continue being a support system, and also let them know there are other resources for more support. If the survivor is open, contact an advocate together, or provide the survivor with the contact information

8. Maintain confidentiality and let the survivor know about mandatory reporting or other information-sharing policies that may apply to you. Inform the survivor that advocates are allowed a higher level of confidentiality

#### When is termination effective?



Domestic violence cannot be used as a basis for denying an applicant/terminating a tenancy by a landlord.



When can a tenant change the locks?

#### **Resident Request**

A resident calls you and describes an incident of an ex-partner who no longer lives at the community, following them home from work, following them into the parking lot and through the community.

Their ex-partner has a key to the home, remains on the lease agreement, and when you look at the ledger, the rent remains current.



What do you do?

#### The Request for Information

Former Resident's attorney sends legal documents requesting information about the tenancy. The tenancy is current; you look at the file and there are two individuals named on the lease.

They want payment information, lease holder information and other information through legal court methods.

You're curious, so you look up the case number at the court house.

How do you respond?

# Two residents, one protection order

Resident A provides the leasing office with an Order of Protection against Resident B. Previously, they co-resided with each other. Resident A also requests to have the locks changed to her apartment and to the common areas to prevent Resident B from entering.

A few days later, Resident B returns and asks you to let him into the apartment to retrieve some of his belongings?



What do you do?

#### Paper thin walls

Residents have reported abusive acts occurring in a unit below and next to them. They report it to be domestic violence.

Resident A has come to office before with bruises on her body, making you suspect he is a victim of possible domestic violence.

How do you respond?



#### Paper thin walls

A resident brings a protection order into the office, identifying one your employees as the alleged perpetrating party.

They ask to change the locks of their apartment because they are afraid the alleged employee/perpetrating party has a key and may retaliate or come into the unit with the common area key.

How do you respond?

- Return security deposit
- Document damages
- Repair damages
- Obtain verifying documents





#### **Obtain verifying documents**

- Police report, or
- Restraining Order, or
- Signed and notarized self-affidavit

Submit claim to the state of Washington Landlord Mitigation Programs
